Introducing the Tufts Sustainability Collective

A new(ish) student sustainability initiative on campus!

Student environmental groups on campus have achieved quite a bit in their tenure on Tufts campus, mobilizing students and accomplishing noticeable changes in how the university thinks and acts. While these organizations have been successful in the past, improvements can be made to increase their effectiveness at involving more students, coordinating among themselves as unique but like-minded groups, and solidifying consistent campaigns that will not die out with the graduation of club leadership.

A group of students sat down last semester to address these issues and have come up with a fantastic solution. The student group Environmental Consciousness Outreach (ECO), which for years has been the foremost environmental organization on campus, is undergoing a metamorphosis to increase its effectiveness and relevancy on campus. Consciousness and outreach are being traded in for action and progress, all the while keeping sustainability at the center of the organization. The newly branded **Tufts Sustainability Collective** will encourage action and progress while maintaining a steady presence on campus by being split into semi-autonomous branches, each in charge of a different aspect of campus sustainability. These branches will be:

- Tufts Bikes, the new campus bike sharing system
- The Student Garden
- The Action Squad, a group that will pursue campaigns on campus, such as the fight against bottled water
- Students for a Just and Stable Future, a state-wide campaign for a 100% clean electricity.

Each branch will be responsible for maintaining their individual initiatives and reaching out to the student body with events and activities to promote campus-wide



Gilbert E. Metcalf, a Professor of Economics at Tufts University and a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research, will be discussing the true costs of Cap and Trade.

Metcalf has taught at Princeton University, the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and MIT. He has served as a consultant to various organizations including the Chinese Ministry of Finance, the U.S. Department of the Treasury, and Argonne National Laboratory. He currently serves as a lead author for the IPCC's Fifth Assessment Report. Metcalf's primary research area is applied public finance with particular interests in taxation, energy, and environmental economics. His current research focuses on policy evaluation and design in the area of energy and climate change.

Lyon & Bendheim Alumni Lecture and Reception ft. Mike Granoff

Mike Granoff, A91, is Head of Oil Independence Policies at Better Place, which aims to reduce the world's dependency on petroleum by providing the services and networks - such as battery switch stations and charge spots - necessary to support electric vehicles. As Head of Oil Independence Policies for Better Place, Granoff works with governments and industry to generate support and provide a policy framework to enable countries to covert from gas to electric powered cars. The company currently operates in Israel, Denmark, Australia and China. Additional pilot testing has begun in Tokyo,

California and Hawaii. According to Deutsche Bank analysts, Better Place "has the potential to eliminate the gasoline engine altogether" and could be a "paradigm shift in the way vehicles and owned and fueled."

The Farm Share Fair brings all of the CSAs together in one place -- to get you the info you need to get signed up! Meet the folks who grow your food, and bring your checkbook to reserve a share! Now's the time to get signed up for the summer.

A CSA (community supported agriculture) share is a weekly box of fresh/delicious/natural veggies (and sometimes meat/fish) delivered by local farms to convenient pickup spots within our community. Shareholders purchase their shares before the season begins -- which helps farmers when they need cash the most, to get their crops going. A typical share lasts 20 weeks from June through October, and costs \$30 per week for 12-15 pounds of produce (\$2-2.50 per pound).

How do global warming and eating organic and local food relate to food justice? How can planting our own food make a difference? And what does the Jewish tradition have to say about it? We'll have a couple of orientation and learning sessions, followed by weekend together at an amazing organic farm, filled with Jewish study, farm work, and activist training.

Adamah, located on Isabella Freedman's property, is the largest Jewish educational farm in North America. Adamah connects people to their roots: to the land, to community, to Judaism, and to themselves by providing educational programs and products in order to build a more sustainable world. Adamah emphasizes hands-on experience and peer leadership to empower participants with skills and confidence to make a difference, and we offer positive ways to connect to the core Jewish principles of awe and gratitude, which inspire participants well after they leave.

We will join a team of Adamah farmers - from seeding to composting to building raised beds, we will get our hands dirty and support the seasonal farm work. Throughout Shabbat there will be opportunities for worship experience, text study, hiking, and learning about economic, social and ecological issues related to food justice.

There will be a \$50 registration fee, due mid-late Februar y as well as two mandatory orientation sessions before the weekend, and once we come back, we'll decide together how to take what we've learned and put it into action in some way and continue growing as a community.
