Federal government launches first electric vehicle pilot program

On May 24, President Obama issued a memorandum directing federal agencies to implement fuel-efficient and innovative fleet-management practices. On the same day, the General Services Administration (GSA) announced the launch of a pilot project to incorporate electric vehicles and technologies into Tom Thumb's Student Garden, the garden club at Tufts, has started a blog to keep everyone updated on the garden over the summer. Its initial purchase of 100 electric vehicles will be leased to 20 agencies, moving the government closer to meeting goals set by the president's 2009 executive order which required the federal government to purchase only alternative fuel vehicles by 2015 and cut petroleum use by 30% by 2020.

Tufts helps local start-up poultry farm

The Friedman School's <u>New Entry Sustainable Farming Project</u> (NESFP) normally aids produce farmers with training in agricultural business techniques. Recently, it has branched out into the poultry industry, helping people like Drew Locke launch his small-scale poultry farm. Locke's family had quit the chicken business in the 70s and warned him of the difficulties involved in poultry farming, but with the help of the NESFP program, Locke has gotten Hillside Poultry Farm up and running, selling cage-free, grass-pastured birds.

One of the biggest challenges for a small farmer was finding a cost-effective way to process the birds and bring them to market. NESFP helped Locke gain access to a Mobile Poultry Processing Unit (MPPU), portable slaughterhouses that can travel from farm to farm and allow several farmers to share the equipment. NESFP and the New England Small Farm Institute (NESFI) joined forces to acquire Massachusett's first MPPU, which has been in operation since 2008.
