Rachael Wolber reports from the field!

Tufts Eco-Reps Coordinator Rachael Wolber reports on waste issues in India

"We need to be able to organize as a community to fight for our rights," said Sashi Pandit, founder of the National Association of Waste Workers (NAWW) in Delhi, India. The "rights" that he spoke of are the rights to pick recyclables out of municipal waste, and earn a small profit. But recently, incentivized by carbon credits, the Delhi government has started contracting private firms to collect waste, forcing the already marginalized waste workers, commonly referred to as "rag pickers", out of their livelihood. Groups like NAWW have tried to fight back with organization and collective action, but it has not been an easy process. My study abroad group got a taste of the reaction this movement is provoking when policemen



showed up to intimidate the association members when we tried to meet with them. And this is not an issue that only affects India-the US is linked to this group through the global recycling

market and the export of e-waste. Overall, this visit showed me that issues of environmental sustainability do not exist in a vacuum-they are inherently linked to human activities.

ENVS Lunch & Learn: Jack Ridge - Environmental Changes Recorded in the Tidal Marshes of Boston Harbor

March 31, 12-1pm Rabb Room, Tisch College Lincoln Filene Center, Tufts University, Medford Campus

The grassy tidal marshes of Boston Harbor and other tidal estuaries of the northeastern U.S. are areas of continuous clay and peat accumulation over at least the last 2000 years. Environmental changes during this time are both natural and anthropogenic. Changes in sediment composition (clay vs. peat), magnetic properties, sand concentration, heavy metal concentrations, and fossils tell us something about such things as sea level change, growth of the marsh, air pollution, colonial clear-cutting of the land surface surrounding the harbor, and construction projects as well as their impact on the harbor. All of these investigations by geology and environmental studies students over the last 22 years have been carried out in various marshes including Belle Isle marsh in Revere, Mill Creek in Saugus, and the Weymouth Fore River. From these studies a composite history of the harbor has been assembled that provides us with a rare continuous record of environmental change.



<u>Jack Ridge</u>, PhD, is a Professor in Tufts Geology Department. He teaches <u>Environmental Geology (GEO 2)</u>, <u>Geomorphology (GEO 32)</u>, and <u>Quaternary and Glacial Geology (GEO 115)</u>.
