#### **Bard's C2C Initiative Recap**

C2C - a national public policy initiative of the Bard Center for Environmental Policy - hosted 13 video-dialogues between campus and congress on energy, climate and jobs as part of their C2C/Earthweeks activities. Students from California to New Hampshire directly engaged Congressional and Senate offices in critical, informed dialogue about various topics from clean energy solutions to global warming.

The consensus emerged that action at the state level is imperative in order to build a powerful clean energy majority in the US capitol, as there will be no national leadership for the next few years. Fighting at the state level for aggressive EPA regulation, both cleaning up the local environment and protecting the climate, will recapture the political momentum needed to cut global warming pollution.

#### 2010 STARS Annual Review

The Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education (AASHE) released its first annual

A tour of the Cube

"STARS: A Year in Review" on April 14, 2011. This report details the sustainability efforts found in the inaugural submissions to the Sustainability Tracking, Assessment, Rating & System (STARS), such as sustainability research opportunities, sustainable dining efforts, and campus-wide social justice initiatives.

- Of the first 37 submissions, which came from a variety of institution types, eight earned a Gold Rating, 19 earned Silver, nine earned Bronze, and one earned a Reporter Rating.
- Seven of the eight STARS Gold institutions scored more than 17 of the 18 possible points in the Co-Curricular Education subcategory, which focuses on non-academic programming that supports sustainability learning.
- On average, 58% of the applicable points in the water subcategory were earned by STARS Participants.
- Ten institutions earned 100% of the points available in both the Diversity and Affordability subcategory and the Coordination and Planning subcategory, which together include a total of 13 sustainability indicators.
- A total of 71 sustainability innovations were reported (nearly two per institution)

Currently, Tufts is in the process of reporting to STARS and is about 90% of the way there. Check back next year to see what rating Tufts earns!
